

It's All about the Roots

here we put down our spiritual roots matters. For some, the old adage "Bloom where you are planted" may offer wisdom; however, the prophet Jeremiah reminds us that if we find ourselves planted in a lava bed or a salty and empty land, we won't do much blooming. We'll be no more than a shriveled, barren bush. So, where we plant our inner spiritual lives makes a difference.

This week's gospel may seem to sap all the joy out of life. Woe if you have money to spend, a banquet to feast on, fun and laughter to dress up your days. Woe to you, it seems to caution, because when you die, the opposite will be your lot. What's so wrong, we wonder, with having cash in our pockets, food on our tables, and a good time once in a while? Life can be downright dreary otherwise.

The answer, of course, is that there is nothing wrong with any of that—unless that's where we put down our roots. In other words, if that's what life is all about, sooner or later, we are likely to discover we have become a barren bush standing in lava waste. Jesus didn't come to suck the joy out of life but to give us a heads up on how to live a life that is full. He hoped we might avoid the lure that can become a wasteland. He hoped we might become "like a tree planted beside the waters that stretches out its roots to the stream" (Jeremiah 17:8).

A NOTE FROM YOUR PASTOR

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I want to take a moment to express my heartfelt thanks to each of you who completed the *Disciple Maker Index* survey from the Catholic Leadership Institute. Your participation in this important effort is a testament to your commitment to the life of our parish, and I am deeply grateful for the time and effort you took to complete the survey.

On average we have 152 parishioners join us for Mass each week. I am thrilled to share that 118 of you completed the digital survey, along with 8 completed the paper surveys. This is a wonderful response that speaks to our dedication to seeing our parish continue to grow and thrive. I would also like to thank Ann Robinson, Connie Saunders and Lucy Brinegar for all their help administering this survey in our parish.

Just to recap, last Fall Bishop Brennan challenged us all to "Bring people to Christ" by growing in our faith, creating disciples, and increasing our evangelization efforts in our Diocese. To assist us, Bishop Brennan enlisted the help of The Catholic Leadership Institute (CLI) which is a nonprofit organization dedicated to empowering Catholic leaders to guide and strengthen their parishes and dioceses. It offers various services aimed at helping church leaders, including priests, pastoral staff, and lay leaders, improve their leadership skills, create a strong vision for their communities, and build a culture of discipleship.

One of the key tools CLI provides is the **Disciple Maker Index (DMI)**, which is a survey designed to gather feedback from parishioners about their faith life and experiences at their parish. The DMI assesses factors such as spiritual growth, engagement, and the effectiveness of the parish in helping members grow as disciples of Christ.

For our parish, the **Disciple Maker Index** will:

- **Provide Insight**: The survey gives a clear picture of where parishioners stand in their spiritual journey, how connected they feel to the church community, and what areas the parish is excelling in or where it can improve.
- **Identify Strengths and Weaknesses**: The DMI will help parish leadership identify areas of strength and places that need attention, such as worship, adult faith formation, community engagement, or outreach programs.
- **Guide Decision Making**: The data from the survey will help our parish leadership make informed decisions about where to focus resources, what programs to enhance, and how to better meet the needs of the parishioners.
- **Empower Growth**: The feedback helps our parish become more focused on nurturing discipleship, improving communication, and creating environments where parishioners can deepen their faith and sense of belonging.
- **Shape the Future**: The insights gained from the survey can be used to develop long-term strategies for growth, engagement, and faith formation.

Now that the survey results have been gathered, the Catholic Leadership Institute team will begin analyzing the information. Once compiled, our parish team will receive the data and work diligently to share it with all of you. Together, we will reflect on the findings, engage in thoughtful conversation, and begin to develop a plan for the future of our parish. This process will help us understand how we live as disciples of Christ and where God calls us to grow in faith and service.

I am excited about the path ahead and look forward to seeing how the Holy Spirit will guide us in the coming months. This journey we are on as a parish is not just about planning for the future but about each of us sharing our unique gifts—our time, our talent, and our treasure—to build up the Body of Christ. We are a family, united in faith, and we can achieve great things together.

Again, thank you for your participation and ongoing commitment to our parish. I am filled with hope for the future, and I believe God has many blessings in store for us as we continue this journey together. May we remain open to His will and be ever more faithful in our mission to live as disciples of Christ.



<u>In case of serious or life-threatening sickness or the actively dying:</u> {Please consider, with Fr. Sebastian out of town, it will take longer to contact a priest. Please call the church office as soon as you can} The church should be contacted as soon as possible. People deserve the opportunity to confess their sins, profess their faith, be anointed, and receive Holy Communion – the foretaste and pledge of eternal life. PLEASE don't wait until after the person is unconscious or so sedated that he or she cannot communicate. It is imperative with current situations, that there be enough time for Fr. to go through the appropriate protocol to visit the actively dying.

<u>In case of Illness</u>: Please call the parish office to let us know if you, a family member, or a parishioner is sick. We can place your name on the prayer list. If requested, Fr Sebastian will arrange for distributing Holy Communion in the home.

Nursing homes & Hospitals: are not permitted to contact the church. If someone you know is in the hospital, please call the church office.

Dear Padre,

I have always been an "every Sunday" Catholic. My problem is that holy Communion doesn't feel that special. I believe that it's the Body and Blood of Christ, but receiving feels "routine." Sometimes I'm even distracted while receiving. Help?

Do you remember the story of the transfiguration of Jesus? (See Luke

9:28–36.) Jesus took his three special disciples, Peter, James, and John, up on the mountain, and while Jesus was praying, what did they do? They fell asleep! In the very presence of Jesus, their Lord and Master.

Human beings cannot maintain feelings of awe and ecstasy for long periods of time. We would be exhausted. Feelings don't always reflect the specialness of the moment. That is why good habits are so important. Feelings may elude us, but we can fall back on the habit of Sunday Mass. Just as two contented, long-married people don't feel like they did on their honeymoon, they still quietly enjoy the habit of each other's company.

Lent is coming soon. You might consider shaking up your routine a little. Attend one weekday Mass. Prepare for Sunday Mass by reading the Scriptures for that Sunday and praying the entrance antiphon or the psalm. If you don't already, consider volunteering as a choir member, lector, or extraordinary minister of holy Communion. Meanwhile, continue to receive holy Communion, giving thanks that it is readily available, and perhaps offer a prayer for communities where Communion every Sunday is not possible.
