A Haunting Question

hat are you looking for?" asks Jesus of the two disciples who come to see who he is and what he is about. They are Jesus' first words in John's Gospel, and that's what the entire Gospel of John is about, an answer to that piercing question.

I spent the week living with that question, never really finding an answer that seemed to fit, or perhaps I got too many answers, all of them somehow falling short. Why do I spend an hour early each morning sitting in the silence? I read some Scripture, but then mostly I sit with the silence. Many are the times when my mind drifts to other times and places and daydreams. Sometimes the silence is scattered with boredom; at

other times it stumbles with prayerful words; and sometimes in the silence I look for answers to the plaguing whys of life. Mostly, though, I sit in the silence. I'd like to call it prayer, but then I wonder if I'm simply floundering in wishful thinking. So I return to that haunting question—"What are you looking for?"

I think perhaps the answer is similar to what I look for when I gather with friends. Sometimes the get-together is engaging, but not always. Sometimes it is memorable, but not always. Sometimes we just hang out, and that can be enough.

Ultimately relationships keep me grounded. That also is why I spend time in the silence. It's what I'm looking for when I pray—to be in relationship with God, to be grounded lest I drift away and grow lost.



Celebrating The 100 Year Anniversary Of Our Sacred Heart Catholic Church Building 1924-2024

Part 1: The Beginning of the Catholic Community in Bluefield 1894-1920

2024 is an exciting year for Sacred Heart Catholic Church as we celebrate the Centennial of the construction and dedication of our beautiful church building.

When Bluefield's first Catholic Priest, Father Emile Olivier, of Riene, France, arrived in 1894 there was so church building. Parishioners were forced to gather at an old laundry establishment on Raleigh Street to worship. On December 14, 1894 Bishop Donahue met with Fr. Olivier and members of the parish to discuss the possible construction of a church building. Parishioners donated \$700 dollars toward the project. Coupled with the personal funds from Fr. Olivier, enough money was raised to build a small church. On Sunday, October 27, 1895, Bluefield's first Catholic church, located on North Mercer Street was dedicated. Fr. Olivier served as priest of the small church for 25 years until his death in 1920.



Ecclesiology: Pilgrim Church (Begins Week of January 15th)

We understand that the Church is a living organism in continuity with Jesus. As a living organism we can look at our history and see how are self-understanding has changed. In this course we will look at the medieval Church and ask questions of authority, community and governance while also looking at the social and political change of these centuries. This will then aid our conversation as we look at Vatican II and its understanding of both episcopal and papal offices. We will also examine these in light of the General Synod.

This is a five-week hybrid course offered through the Diocese and the Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation of the University of Dayton. You will be able to work online taking quizzes and accessing material, as well as meet once a week via Zoom for class lecture and discussion with the course facilitator, Dr. Rodica Stoicoiu. Dear Padre,

If St. Matthew was an apostle, why do we have Gospels from other writers who were not apostles of Jesus? Since he knew Jesus personally, wouldn't his Gospel be the definitive one?

There are two assumptions that need to be addressed. One is that the Apostle Matthew is the same as the evangelist Matthew. The book's title, the Gospel According to Matthew, was added to the text in the second century. Whether it was written by the same Matthew or someone else, it still traces back to the experience of the apostles. The Scriptures are the inspired word of God, and Christians can rely on the truth of the Gospel message through the guidance of the Holy Spirit.


The other assumption is that one Gospel is somehow more "definitive." All four Gospels are the inspired word of God. A Gospel is not a history of the life of Christ. It is a collection of stories that each evangelist arranged in a specific way so that they would make sense to a particular audience. For the Gospel of Matthew, the audience was predominantly Jewish, but these Jewish Christians were being excluded from mainstream Judaism and perhaps were wondering among themselves if Jesus was really the Messiah for whom they had waited so long. Matthew's Gospel asserts repeatedly that Jesus is a

true Israelite who fulfills Old Testament prophecies, while also reinterpreting the Law of Moses in a new direction that includes all nations.
